Countryside Rangers

The Ranger Service cares for the park by carrying out site patrols, practical conservation work and helping visiting schools and other groups to explore and understand the natural environment.

Volunteers such as the Wintersett Wildlife Group help the Countryside Rangers to manage and maintain the site. Recent works include installation of Sand Martin banks, Tern rafts and nest boxes which provide homes for a variety of birds.



Sustainability

The visitor centre is working towards being sustainable. Solar panels located on the roof provide hot water and electricity; and wood sourced locally from Haw Park Wood fuels the wood burning stove. The benches located around the park are also produced from timber sourced from the woodland.

Anglers Country Park, Wintersett

is a 64 hectare country park located 4 miles south east of Wakefield. It is dominated by a lake, surrounded by grassland, woodland and a wetland area known as the 'Pol'.



This site once formed one of the deepest opencast coal mines in the country reaching a depth of 250 feet.

Since the opening of the park in 1986, it has become one of the most important inland bird sites in Yorkshire and the lake is designated a Site of Scientific Interest for its migratory birds.

Facilities include free car parking with disabled bays, a visitor centre with Interpretative Officers who will provide information on local and national countryside and conservation issues, a **cafe** and **toilets**.

In the centre learn about the pioneering conservation work of Charles Waterton and its influence on today's naturalists. There is a "Kiddies' Corner" with puzzles, games and craft activities.

Electric mobility scooters are available on loan, free of charge.


Outdoor Activities

The 2 mile Lakeside Walk can be enjoyed by walkers, joggers, cyclists and horse riders; whilst the hides located on the main lake and Pol provide excellent observation points for the local wildlife.

To the rear of the visitor centre, you can take a short stroll around the Woodland Walk. Picnic areas can also be found behind the visitor centre and overlooking the lake.

Interpretation panels located around the park provide the

visitor with points of interest and benches allow rest points to take in the views.



Anglers Country Park is a Local Nature Reserve which is carefully managed to conserve and improve its habitats for the benefit of wildlife and for the visitor to enjoy.

There is always something different to see as the wildlife changes with the seasons.

Spring sees the arrival of the swifts and swallows which can be seen swooping over the lake and grassland for insects. Summer brings damselflies and dragonflies to the water's edge. Autumn sees waterfowl from northern Europe, including goldeneye and widgeon which spend the winter on site before returning to their breeding grounds.

Wildlife sitings are noted on a blackboard at the entrance to the park.
